1. CLASSIC ATLANTA VIBES VS. NEW ATLANTA FAVORITES

KEEP

Visit Atlanta's bustling metropolis, where Black culture has shaped its past and present. Come for the city's celebrated classics, plus a growing list of new and fresh things to do.

You can't talk about classic Atlanta without mentioning the bustling **Sweet Auburn District**, which was the commercial center of Black Atlanta in the 1920s and continues to be an iconic part of the city. Explore the mile-and-a-half stretch of Auburn Avenue established as a National Historic Landmark in 1976—where the vibrant street art dazzles.

The Busy Bee Cafe, founded by self-taught cook Lucy "Momma Lucy" Jackson in 1947, is a must-stop for anyone who loves soul food. It's also the recipient of a 2022 James Beard Classics Award. Expect a warm greeting and flavorful grub as you indulge your taste buds with delightfully homestyle Southern dishes like fried chicken, candied yams, cornbread dressing, collard greens and black-eyed peas.

For more storied locales, visit the Atlanta University Center on the city's west side. It's the world's largest consortium of African American private institutions of higher education and includes Clark Atlanta University, Spelman College, Morehouse College and Morehouse School of Medicine. Walk the sprawling campuses and soak in the dynamic atmosphere brought by their students and notable alumni such as Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., Alice Walker, Spike Lee and others.

Zooming forward a few eras, Atlanta rollerskate culture has thrived for decades, in no small part because of **Cascade Fun Center**. Since opening in the Cascade area in 2000, it's been a favorite place for skate lovers to gather, and you can marvel at acrobatic rollerskaters, dance teams and novices together at the rink. Celebrities like Beyoncé, Sean "Love" Combs (formerly known as P. Diddy), Usher and Magic Johnson have all been spotted reveling in Cascade's lively energy.

As far as new Atlanta goes, don't miss **Ponce City Market**. It sits on a historical stretch of Ponce De Leon Avenue in Old Fourth Ward—the neighborhood where Martin Luther King, Jr. once lived—and has become a seat for thriving Black-owned businesses. **The Village Retail** is an alluring marketplace offering goods from dozens of local Black entrepreneurs. Drop by **Bar Vegan** for tapas like the onion-ring flight, green-goddess pizza and cheesesteak eggrolls. Then head to the rooftop for a gorgeous view of the city and local brews at **9 Mile Station**, or savor a cocktail and skee ball, mini golf and other games at **Skyline Park**.

Call it a night at the Hyatt Regency Atlanta. Once called the "hotel of hope," it was one of the only hotels to welcome civil rights activists like Xernona Clayton and Martin Luther King, Jr., who hosted the annual convention of the Southern Christian Leadership Conference there in 1967. Today, it has all the expected modern amenities and a central location to all the fun things to do in the city.



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Take a peek into Atlanta's trap music and culture at this museum conceptualized by rapper T.I. who hails from Atlanta's west side. Check out the photos and authentic memorabilia from stars like Cardi B and 2 Chainz and book the museum's escape room, aka "Escape the Trap," to up the fun with friends.

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2. THERE'S MORE THAN THE BEACH ON FAMILY-FRIENDLY JEKYLL ISLAND

Adventures go way beyond the beach when it comes to vacationing on Georgia's coastal paradise, Jekyll Island. Your family can splash, explore and see the sights—with time to play along the shores of the popular barrier island.

Start by seeing the destination's robust population of bottlenose dolphins. Take a 90-minute dolphin tour along the Intracoastal Waterway with Jekyll Island Boat Tours to witness their perky, playful ways in their natural habitat. Look closely and you'll spot other marine life, such as slow-moving manatees, plus water birds like long-legged herons and swooping osprey. Book a memorable sunset tour to admire seacoast clouds painted in delicate pinks and golds as dolphins frolic around you.

Next stop is the Georgia Sea Turtle Center, where you can learn about wild sea turtles. This spot boasts a rehabilitation program and all types of interactive exhibits. Or partake in a hands-on eco-experience with Gatorology at Horton Pond to learn about the American alligator's history, biology and conservation—and why they're known as true dinosaurs.

A playful day at **Summer Waves Water Park** means you can splash your way down Man o' War, bob along the Turtle Creek lazy river in a tube, catch a wave in the Frantic Atlantic pool or soak up the sun's golden rays in your own private cabana. Back on dry land, try mini golf or tennis. Rent a bike or a breezy, eco-friendly Red Bug electric car to explore the island. Finish the day with a trail ride through the maritime forest with **Three Oaks Farm**, where you'll see the salt marsh and **Driftwood Beach** from atop gentle horses with experienced guides.

Time to eat? Fill your family's hungry tums with waterfront favorites like seafood mac 'n cheese and poached Georgia white shrimp at **The Wharf**. And don't forget dessert! Grab some froyo at **Fuse Frozen Yogurt** or freshly made fudge at the **Island Sweets Shoppe**.

Keep the nautical vibes going with a stay at the new beachfront **Residence Inn Jekyll Island**. Your whole group will delight in the vistas from oceanview hotel suites, many of which offer fully equipped kitchens and separate living areas, along with the island's largest heated outdoor pool and lapping water views from **Shore**, the hotel's own indoor/outdoor restaurant.

Of course, a visit to Jekyll Island wouldn't be complete without seeing its many miles of peaceful, unspoiled beaches. Frolic, swim, build sandcastles and wait for sunset. Your kids will forever remember the kaleidoscope of sherbet-y colors blazing over tranquil waters as blue skies fade to welcome the stars.

3. COLUMBUS: WHERE CITY & NATURE UNITE

In Columbus, you don't have to choose between city amenities and catching a few thrills as you explore the area's beloved natural gems. You have the pick of the bunch, so to speak.

Start outside on the cascading **Chattahoochee River** with **Whitewater Express**, an expert outfitter that takes you shooting through the rapids on the world's longest urban whitewater-rafting stretch. (In fact, the water is so primed for loops, drops and rolls that the world's best are set to compete here in the 2023 ICF Kayak Freestyle World Championships.) Or take a different view of this fabled river from 12 stories above by ziplining across it with **Blue Heron Zipline Adventure Park**. You'll soar over racing water from Georgia to Alabama and back through the area's verdant oak canopies.

After a morning of adrenaline-inducing outdoor play, **Banks Food Hall** is a must-stop for an upbeat, inviting atmosphere that's just steps away from rafting. With dining choices spanning poke to hot dogs and authentic Filipino cuisine in its sprawling indoor/outdoor space, you can sip a cocktail or craft beer at the bar and wind down while soaking up live tunes. Take a postmeal stroll for pleasant park views and riverfront beauty along the meandering **Chattahoochee RiverWalk** that's accessed just across the street.

Next, delve into America's expansive military history at **The National Infantry Museum**, with interactive galleries aimed at preserving the legacy of the U.S. Army Infantrymen. Give the combat simulators your best shot, watch a military documentary on the Giant Screen Theater and tour exhibits dedicated to the Revolutionary, World and Cold wars.

Wrap things up in the heart of the city's action at Hotel Indigo. You'll find it tucked in Columbus' vibrant Uptown neighborhood, celebrated as the area's thriving entertainment district. Book a plush riverview room for rushing-water vistas. Check out Indigo's lounge-worthy outdoor pool, and then savor the gorgeous twilight landscape from the hotel's roof at Eighteen85 Rooftop Bar + Kitchen. It's best enjoyed with an artisanal cocktail in hand (think a minty peach mojito or a Bee's Knees, made with tart lemon, calming honey and gin) while sampling small plates. Try the tender brisket tacos, buttermilk-fried quail with ghost-pepper honey and pulled-pork barbecue nachos.



TELLUS SCIENCE MUSEUM

The Fossil Gallery is one of the museum's top draws thanks to close encounters with a T-rex, megalodon and saber-toothed cat. For those that can't get enough, follow up the visit with some time on the museum's Fossil Dig, where you can print your own Fossil Hunting License and check off your finds.

4. CONNECT WITH CARTERSVILLE'S ART, CULTURE & HISTORY

Historic Cartersville—northwest of Atlanta—isn't loved only for its scenic beauty (of which it has a bounty). Visit for all the stories told through its vibrant museums, unique historical sites and renowned parks.

Make time for **Tellus Science Museum**, an expansive local institution showcasing natural history via interactive experiences such as a Discovery Garden, planetarium and observatory, fossil gallery and more. Or visit the sprawling **Booth Western Art Museum** where you'll see signed letters from every U.S. president (a visitor favorite), as well as paintings and sculptures celebrating cowboys and gals, fur trappers and mountain men, American Indians and much more. Keep things rolling at the **Savoy Auto Museum**, where rotating exhibitions feature automobiles around themes like "microcars" and "fabulous fins," allowing visitors to appreciate their design and construction. Both Tellus Science Museum and Booth Western Art Museum are part of the Smithsonian Affiliates network.

Discover the rich history of the area with a trip to the **Bartow History Museum**, housed downtown in an 1869 red-brick courthouse. This spot focuses on two centuries of regional history—from the area's 1800s Cherokee residents right up to the people living in Cartersville today. Increase the amusement factor by asking the docent for a scavenger-hunt sheet—you'll like searching for artifacts to check off among the photos, documents and interactive exhibits. When you're done, stroll downtown for its assortment of restaurants, public art and antique shops.

Tour the Noble Hill-Wheeler Memorial Center, a landmark of historical significance in nearby Cassville. It was constructed in 1923 from Rosenwald Schools funding (a crucial early-20th-century effort creating schools for Black children across the South). Restored, it now functions as a heritage museum reflecting Black life and culture from the late 1800s to the present via school relics, area antiques and a historical resource library.

South of town, learn about another aspect of the area's history at the **Etowah Indian Mounds State Historic Site**. This special landscape honors the rich traditions, skills and craftsmanship of the Native Americans of the Mississippian culture, who populated the area along the rippling Etowah River. Six earthen mounds, a village site and more can be seen along its grassy trails. The mounds are thought to be the most well-preserved Mississippian culture site in the Southeastern U.S. and the area a cultural, political and religious hub for thousands of Native Americans from 1000 and 1500 A.D. Stop at the museum to see artifacts like carvings, jewelry, shells and tools.

Soak up even more history with a stay on the grounds of a 19th-century Southern manor, now in scenic ruins. The sumptuous **Barnsley Resort** in nearby **Adairsville** features lovely cottages modeled after English country homes, a championship golf course with rugged mountain views and farm-to-table dining at **Woodlands Grill and Rice House** (you'll sample fresh produce from the resort's very own gardens!).

5. DISCOVER NATURAL WONDERS AT THE OKEFENOKEE SWAMP

Boat tours, nature shows and boardwalk observation areas dive into swamp life at Okefenokee Swamp Park & Adventures near Waycross, in southeast Georgia. Experience nature up close under a lush and fluttering forest canopy, take a boat or train tour, and explore wildlife on a primitive nature walk dappled by sunlight. Watch carefully and you may spot alligators, turtles, bobcats, black bears, skunks, wild boars, common minks, river otters, foxes and other wild creatures that live in Okefenokee National Wildlife Refuge, of which the swamp park is a part.

For a panoramic view overlooking the marshy swamp and surrounding nature, head to the 90-foot-tall **Observation Tower**. It takes 102 calf-burning steps to reach the top, but the views are worth the climb. Then, if you're still longing for more swamp goodness, prolong your stay with a fully outfitted platform-camping experience found deep in Okefenokee's wilderness. Platforms feature all you need for remote camping over open water, like partially covered roofs, cooking nooks, picnic tables and more.

Back at the swamp, a guided moonlight paddle means you can see sparkles in the vast night sky from a different angle. Listen as fish splash and critters call to each other in a symphony of evening sounds you won't hear in the city.

Boat and bike rentals, guided tours and multiday overnight boat excursions are all part of the fun at Okefenokee. Plan your visit around special events like kayaking with a naturalist, stargazing, sunrise tours, or birding and botanical excursions. Stop by the park's nature center for interactive exhibits before you go.

Make Newell Lodge & Resort in nearby Folkston the home base for all your escapades. Surrounded by 57 acres of old-growth oaks (and all the glimmering fireflies you could ask for), this secluded getaway delivers big on rustic charm. Come for the resort's private, RV-friendly campsites and cozy vacation cabins, then explore the forested landscape by horseback. The on-site Swampfire Backwoods Bistro will satisfy lunch and dinner cravings with locally sourced rib-eye and slices of decadent chocolate and Key lime pie. Or have them pack you a to-go lunch for your daytime adventures.

STARS IN YOUR EYES

As night falls, head to Stephen C. Foster State Park inside the swamp—it's named a gold-tier International Dark Sky Park for its astonishing darkness and an amazing opportunity to see planets, comets and star clusters.

6. FIND SUBURBAN BLISS IN ROSWELL, ALPHARETTA & MARIETTA

Atlanta's suburbs are OTP, or "outside the perimeter," as the locals call towns outside I-285, and they just may become your favorite place to stay. Each spot has its own delightful character, and they're all easy to travel between given their close proximity to each other.

Upscale Alpharetta: Snuggled between the North Georgia mountains and Atlanta, Alpharetta is a hot spot for high-end dining and entertainment. Stay at the elegant Hotel at Avalon, an airy, modern property with luxury rooms and suites just steps from top shops and restaurants. Dine on flavorful fare like green-tahini hummus and shish kabobs at the Avalon outpost of Persian restaurant Rumi's Kitchen or spicy prawn tacos at The Cape Restaurant & Beach Bar. Listen to the echoing croons of popular acts like Stevie Nicks and the Black Keys on the grassy lawn at nearby Ameris Bank Amphitheatre or play at the multientertainment venue Topgolf.

Nature-Loving Roswell: Explore the great outdoors in the neighboring city of Roswell. Wander 2.5 miles of winding trails across wetlands and through a wooded forest at the 127-acre Chattahoochee Nature Center along the Chattahoochee River, where you can spot colorful butterflies, sunbathing turtles and other native wildlife. Or trek the more-than-5-mile Vickery Creek Trail at Roswell Mill for views of a tumbling spillway waterfall and a flourishing forest. Visitors can also paddle the rushing river on a guided canoe excursion and soar 55 feet above the trees via a zipline canopy tour or aerial-adventure course. After a day of exploring, stroll along historic downtown's Canton Street, dotted with trendy restaurants serving a variety of cuisines, including the upscale Southern spot Table & Main and Cajun-inspired Roux on Canton, both of which have shaded patios.

Charming Marietta: From walkable, tree-lined streets to shops and restaurants, scenic Marietta Square is the heart of the city. Sample global fare at Marietta Square Market, with 18 vendors serving everything from heaping bowls of ramen to Vietnamese bubble tea, Cuban sandwiches, Neapolitan pizzas and Caribbeanfusion vegan cuisine. Grab it to go and listen to sweet melodies for free during seasonal lunchtime concerts in 1.35-acre Glover Park. Children can climb on the playground and swoosh down a slide before turning cartwheels on a fresh carpet of grass. For an adults-night out, visit the historic Strand Theatre, which screens classic films and hosts live music, plays and other events throughout the year.



7. GEORGIA'S ELECTRIC

Charge up your electric vehicle (EV) and recharge your mental battery on an environmentally friendly roadtrip from the mountains to the coast.

Not only is Georgia home to stunning waterfalls, cosmopolitan cities and 100 miles of sandy shores, but it is also a hub for the country's rapidly growing electric-vehicle industry. Whatever kind of EV you drive, you're covered when you need to recharge the batteries—yours or your car's—with an EV-oriented roadtrip across the state spanning destinations like Atlanta, Macon, the Atlantic Coast and Savannah.

ATLANTA TO SAVANNAH: NEARLY 286 MILES

START IN ATLANTA: Begin at The Battery, one of Atlanta's top entertainment and dining districts. The area's eight parking lots provide several fast-charging EV stations that are also open to guests staying at Aloft at The Battery Atlanta and Omni Hotel at The Battery. Power up while dining on gourmet sandwiches at Savi Provisions, shopping for wellness-centric gifts like bath salts and soaps at Sugarboo & Co., or free falling at iFly Atlanta, an indoor-skydiving facility.

85 MILES TO MACON: Stop in Macon for the 1842 Inn, a historical—not to mention palatial—Greek Revival-style mansion now operating as a bed and breakfast. Sample 1842's signature drink, the mint julep, while your wheels get a boost from the on-site charger. Then head out for some of Macon's top attractions like the Tubman Museum, Georgia Sports Hall of Fame, Mercer Music at Capricorn and the Museum of Arts and Sciences. Eat at locals' favorite spots like Dovetail for artisanal cocktails or H&H Restaurant for hearty Southern soul food.

183 MILES TO TYBEE ISLAND: Named one of the country's best beaches by *Travel* + *Leisure*, Tybee's historic North Beach offers three EV stations for recharging. Plug in while soaking up the sun's warming rays, taking a stretchy SUP yoga class or a scenic nature tour with Sea Kayak Georgia.

It's not a trip to the coast without freshly caught seafood. Dine on local shrimp and grits and pan-seared scallops at Sundae Cafe at Tybee, an upscale restaurant that sources most of its dishes from nearby purveyors and uses only biodegradable products. Another sustainably minded local spot is Sea Wolf Tybee, which serves oysters, mussels and hot dogs, including a vegan Sonoran-style brat so tasty you won't even miss the pork.

18 MILES TO SAVANNAH: Make your way back inland and keep motoring to Savannah for a night at the Thompson. Not only does it offer six charging stations, a luxurious stay here means easy access to the city's bustling historic district along the beckoning Savannah River. While your car charges, stroll the idyllic Riverwalk, sip a classic old fashioned at Bar Julian for towering cityscape views (it's on Savannah's tallest rooftop) or shop the mix of boutiques on nearby River Street.







8. FIND ROMANCE AT LAKE OCONEE

Rekindle your relationship along Lake Oconee's 374 miles of dazzling, secluded shoreline rimmed by lanky Georgia pines. Just 85 miles east of Atlanta, **The Ritz-Carlton Reynolds, Lake Oconee** offers all the luxuries of lake life—like reflective water overlooks, swoon-inducing room service and a 30,000-squarefoot, lounge-worthy spa. Whether you book a private lake house, cozy cottage or swanky modern suite, this tranquil resort spot will feel like it's all for you.

The sprawling hotel footprint means plenty of private time, too. Connect with your person as you paddle the peaceful azure reservoir or sip aromatic wine while the sun dips gracefully behind the horizon. Book a poolside cabana, toast your sweetie over a private bourbon tasting or reserve a tee time at one of five championship golf courses. Pedaling through an 8-mile network of abundant lakeside paths on a complimentary resort bike is another must-do. After all that outdoorsy fun, unwind with a couple's massage in the spa's serene private suite before sampling the icy plunge pools, soothing steam rooms and a super-toasty sauna. At **Gaby's by the Lake**—the property's relaxed, poolside eatery—sip on chilled cocktails (margarita, anyone?) and nosh on casual fare like lowcountry fish tacos and the coastal-bites-meetcomfort-food lobster grilled cheese. You'll be treated to sundrenched views of rippling Lake Oconee from every angle of the restaurant's popular flagstone deck. Head to the **Barrel Room** come evening for fireside tables and sipping whiskeys.

Venture into downtown **Greensboro** to sample everything from a crisp Kolsch to a refreshing pale ale at the expansive indoor/ outdoor space at **Oconee Brewing Company**, or grab coffee and provisions like pastries and fresh produce from the eclectic **Ripe Thing Market** for an intimate lakeside picnic. For a casual couple's night out, try Southern classics like a country shrimp boil and the famed buttermilk pie at **The Yesterday Cafe** before finishing things off with a sunset cruise on the *Spirit of Oconee*.

9. EXPERIENCE GEORGIA'S GREAT OUTDOORS IN HELEN

A vacation to Helen means you'll fall in love with more than its numerous Insta-worthy photo ops (yes, the whimsical burgh looks like it's straight out of a European fairytale!). The picturesque, Bavarian-inspired mountain town is also home to some of northeast Georgia's best outdoor adventures.

Experience Mother Nature's wild grandeur by floating down the famed flows of the **Chattahoochee River** with **Cool River Tubing** or whipping through the treetops for a bird's-eye view of the forest's dense canopies with **Nacoochee Adventures**' zipline expeditions. Excite your senses with Nacoochee's Thriller Giant Swing that lifts you a towering 50 feet up, then sends you swiftly plummeting (and likely shrieking) to the ground.

At Helen's **Unicoi State Park & Lodge** (tucked within the Chattahoochee National Forest), you can do it all. Love to fish? Roam—with your fly-fishing rod in hand—to **Smith Creek**'s languid waters for an abundance of silvery trout. More of a storyteller? Roast marshmallows around a crackling communal fire pit while spinning tall tales. Fancy yourself an explorer? Search for hidden treasures with the park's family-friendly GPS scavenger hunt. And you can record it all with one of the park's handy GoPro cameras, available to guests through the **Unicoi Adventure Lodge** program.

Year-round, park visitors can pedal through rugged terrain on a serpentine, 7.5-mile mountain-biking path, hike to the tumbling **Anna Ruby Falls** and practice 3-D and static archery at the on-site range. In the warmer months, paddle or kayak through the pristine waters of **Unicoi Lake**, then take a dip to cool off on its dedicated swimming beach.

Stay in the park's striking **Barrel Cabins**, rustic one- and twobedroom structures equipped with full kitchens, fireplaces and balconies with rocking chairs for soaking in lake and forest views. The park also has nearly 100 campsites, ranging from RV hookups to glampsites with minifridges and outdoor grills. Or retreat to a backcountry "squirrel's nest," where you can string up hammocks to rest under a sky so dark it resembles sparkling diamonds on inkyblack satin.

10. FEEL THE PRIDE IN SAVANNAH bv Matt Kirouac

Immediately upon arrival in Savannah, it's clear this is a place of inclusion. The friendly greeting starts at the airport, modeled after a charming town square with rocking chairs for sittin' awhile, and the sentiment is woven throughout this LGBTQIA+ friendly city.

While Savannah Pride brings musical performances, carnival games, costumes and parties—including the "Masqueerade"—to Ellis Square and nearby venues in late October, LGBTQIA+ visitors find comfort in welcoming businesses, restaurants and activities year-round.

Morning, noon and late night, Savannah's diverse, artsy atmosphere (including the famed Savannah College of Art and Design, home to more than 13,000 students from all walks of life) runs the gamut from Perc Coffee, a rustic-chic cafe where the staff is as diverse as its farmfresh coffee list, to lowcountry brunch at downtown's **B. Matthew's** Eatery, a fried-green-tomato-slinging restaurant that's a selfdescribed safe space for the trans community.

Come lunch, feast at Mrs. Wilkes Dining Room, a pretty-in-pink boardinghouse-turned-restaurant—and a popular stopover for politicians and LGBTQIA+ celebrities—known for gracious hospitality and cozy comforts like fried chicken, sweet-potato soufflé and meatloaf

Later, dance the night away at **Club One**, a massive, multilevel gay bar with billiards, drag shows, karaoke and music into the wee hours. Or explore another side of the city's LGBTQIA+ scene on a Yes, Queen! Drag Pub Crawl, a lively and hilarious walking tour led by eccentric queens like Marie Con and J. Deveraux.

After a night of revelry, relax your eyes at the Brice Hotel, a chic downtown boutique from Kimpton, one of the country's most LGBTQIA+ friendly brands, complete with an outdoor pool, a serene garden and free bike rentals.



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11. GIRLS TRIP TO GEORGIA WINE COUNTRY

Take your best friends and head for the hills—Georgia's photogenic Blue Ridge Mountains, to be exact—for a girls getaway like no other. With more wineries and vineyards than any other part of the state (12 tasting rooms and eight wineries), **Dahlonega**'s lush landscape is ideal for all types of parties and groups. Come for award-winning sips, breathtaking panoramas and, of course, lots of bonding in bucolic Georgia Wine Country.

Craving gorgeous mountain views? Sip on a spicy, fruit-forward cab franc-merlot at family-run **Three Sisters Vineyards & Winery** or a bright and balanced chardonnay at **Kaya Vineyard & Winery**, both of which have expansive outdoor decks where you can listen to live music while soaking in sweeping foothills vistas. Book a VIP tasting at Three Sisters to learn about their specialized wine-making process with an on-site sommelier, or take Kaya's off-road 4x4 tour for hands-on schooling in how they grow their grapes over 90 scenic acres.

Feeling more indulgent? At Dahlonega Resort and Vineyard, try a flight of wines in the luxuriant gardens or in the rusticchic house restaurant, which serves modern American fare like seared scallops and burgers. Or take your pals to European-style Wolf Mountain Vineyard to sample effervescent wines along with red and white varietals on the veranda. Reserve one of Wolf's decadent Sunday brunches, celebrated for rotating (and mouthwatering) themes like Tribute to Tuscany and Celebration of French Cuisine.

Are you lovers of Italy? Experience Tuscany in Georgia at Montaluce Winery & Restaurant—the Taste of Montaluce menu includes pours of red and white wines and a souvenir glass, while on-site restaurant Trattoria di Montaluce serves housemade Italian pastas. Stretch your legs with a guided "wine hike" along sunlight-speckled trails that meander through the woods, along the rushing Etowah River and around the grapevines. You'll end your walking adventure with a five-pour tasting menu back at the restaurant. Finally, sample everything from dry and bold cabernet blends to sweet muscadine wines at the pastoral Frogtown Cellars, another Italian-inspired North Georgia vineyard open daily for tastings along with its own bistro.

Rest your sleepy heads back at **Dahlonega Resort and Vineyard** where your whole group can bunk together in craftsman cottages boasting crackling fire pits or retreat to their own comfy rooms and suites. Or rent your own villa at Montaluce for a Tuscanstyled togetherness retreat overlooking the abundant vineyards.

Dick Your Perfect SPRING

SPRINGTIME IN GEORGIA IS AN ANNUAL REMINDER OF THE MANY AMAZING REASONS FOR VISITORS AND RESIDENTS ALIKE TO GET OUTSIDE AND INTO THE BEAUTIFUL NATURAL PLAYGROUND OF THE PEACH STATE.

There's no shortage of blooming flora this time of year, which means Georgia's garden wonderlands make for a blooming-great getaway. At The State Botanical Gardens in Athens, a rainbow of daffodils, roses, snapdragons and cherry blossoms kick off the season, and heirloom roses, fruit crops and native species give you a peek at the state's agricultural history. There's also plenty of opportunity for outdoor amazement in North Georgia at Gibbs Gardens in Ball Ground, when the early March to mid-April Daffodil Colorfest blankets the landscape in a frothy, vibrant yellow. Take an unhurried stroll through Atlanta Botanical Garden's gorgeously manicured paths and sculptural plant installations. Sit beside the pond to absorb the peaceful garden sounds and fresh aromas at Savannah Botanical Gardens, or participate in a Lunch & Learn at the intimate Columbus Botanical Gardens. Not far away is the expansive scenery of Callaway Resort & Gardens in Pine Mountain, whose sprawling landscape—covered with thousands of gem-colored azaleasoffers tennis, golf, ziplining, the Cecil B. Day Butterfly Center and the resort's luxurious lodge and spa.



TIMBERLINE GLAMPING



Georgia's coastline isn't the only area where you can find vast vistas of the state's many beautiful bodies of water. If you're less into the rough-it sort of outdoors adventure and more into fanciful forest relaxation, go for a night of luxury at Timberline Glamping Company near Georgia's tallest waterfall, Amicalola Falls, at the southern end of the

Appalachian Trail in Dawsonville. If someone accuses you of cheating because your heated or air-conditioned tent has electrical outlets, a coffee maker and a minifridge, just invite them in for a visit.

It'd be quite a shame to spend time in this gorgeous agricultural state without taking advantage of every chance available to pick and enjoy your own veggies, fruit and other produce—and berries are spring's finest. Head to **Rutland Farms** in Tifton to pick them (and gobble up their strawberry ice cream) and do some bass fishing. During picking hours at **Southern Belle Farm** in McDonough, fill your own bucket with some of their sweet berries, ride the cow train and meet the farm creatures in Bell's Barnyard. Or spend time at Fort Valley's **Lane Southern Orchards** to pick more gorgeous strawberries (and even some peaches as early as mid-May!).





\heartsuit IDEAL DESTINATION

Springtime in Augusta is pure Georgia magic, with the return of sunnier skies and warming temperatures. There's no better time to experience Georgia's second-largest city than when it's shaded in newly sprouted leaves and bedazzled in blooms. Go bass fishing at Mistletoe State Park, home of one of the largest lakes in the Southeast. Then take a pedaling tour with Bike Bike Baby to see the downtown district's public art, churches, cemeteries and other important spots related to African American culture—including, of course, the soulful areas of town that inspired Augusta's own James Brown. For an evening of amazing entertainment, buy tickets to one of many concerts or festivals hosted at the Jessye Norman Amphitheatre, which sits alongside the Savannah River. And give your perfect spring evening a proper Augustan nightcap with an old fashioned and panoramic views of the city's streetscape at legendary rooftop bars Edgar's Above Broad or Jackson's Bluff.

THERE'S NO WRONG WAY TO SPEND SUMMER IN GEORGIA. WITH SO MANY OPTIONS FOR UNFORGETTABLE TIMES, WHETHER YOU'RE OUT IN THE SUN OR STAYING COOL INSIDE, BE SURE TO MAKE THE MOST OF THE SEASON WITH SOME OF THE STATE'S BEST SUMMER ACTIVITIES.

Getting out on the water is one way to explore the splendor of North Georgia's abundant natural charm and beauty. **Toccoa River Tubing Company** in McCaysville offers kayak, canoe and tube rentals for floated fun just outside Blue Ridge, along with **Cartecay River Experience**, whose tube and kayak rentals get you three hours of deep-water floating with a few rapids that'll make your heart race in Ellijay. At **Cool River Tubing**, you can take a quick tubing trip on the Chattahoochee River with the family (including special pet tubes!) before hopping out to grab a bite to eat in Helen. **Nantahala Outdoor Center** serves up the whitewater on the Chattahoochee River, with trips for all skill levels and ages, including some with lunch options.

Water activities aren't exclusive to North Georgia. There's plenty of splashy action farther down state, including the new Man o' War attraction at **Summer Waves Water Park** on Jekyll Island, along with Statesboro's weekend-only, resort-style **Splash in the Boro!** with its lazy river, wave pool and more. If you're closer to Valdosta, you'll find acres of wild and wet slides, drops and waves at **Splash Island Waterpark at Wild Adventures**. Or head down to LaGrange's **Great Wolf Lodge Water Park**, a massive indoor water park full of giant slides and expansive pools (always kept at a perfectly warm 84 degrees), where you can also stay the night and do it all again the next day.







After all that summer sun, head indoors to cool off. Visit the Telfair Museums' three Savannah locations, including the stunning architecture of the Moshe Safdie-designed Jepson Center and its ArtZeum interactive children's activities. Telfair Academy features 19th- and 20th-century art from both Europe and America. Tour Telfair's Regency-style Owens-Thomas House & Slave Quarters to learn about the complicated contrast between the free and enslaved. See the meticulously maintained archives at the Atlanta History Center, including the *Native Lands* exhibit that showcases stories and the history of Georgia's original inhabitants. The High Museum of Art is another can't-miss Atlanta institution loved for its expansive collections of American, African, European and folk art, among other world-class offerings.

Theaters such as the **Grand Opera** in Macon, District Live in Savannah and the Cobb Energy Center just north of Atlanta provide entertainment of all sorts, from concerts to off-Broadway plays and other live shows to wind down your evenings. Or tour some of the state's marvelous historical homes, including Hay House, a Renaissance Revival mansion in Macon, and the magnificent Hills & Dales Estate, overlooking dreamy 19th-century gardens in LaGrange. Visit Milledgeville to stand on the grounds of Andalusia, iconic author Flannery O'Connor's rural farmhouse.

Water babies will love summertime in Gainesville for all the aquatic fun you can wish for on Lake Lanier. Located just an hour north of Atlanta, the Queen City of the Mountains offers an abundance of warm-weather activities, ranging from relaxing to invigorating. GET AWAY TOGETHER

Visit Georgia's Blue Ridge, one of the South's best small mountain towns, only 90 miles from Atlanta but worlds away.



Blue Ridge is the

perfect place to escape the city, with stunning mountain views, pristine lakes, rivers and creeks, hiking trails, charming nearby small towns, wineries, breweries, great dining, shopping and friendly people. Rent a luxury mountain cabin for a peaceful mountain escape, or stay downtown, where everything is within walking distance. Blue Ridge was established as a railroad town, with the depot at its heart. Visitors would ride the train to the mountains to get away from the summer heat and take in the mineral waters. You can tube, kayak or raft the Toccoa River in Blue Ridge or McCaysville, rent a pontoon or paddleboard on Lake Blue Ridge or go whitewater rafting on the Ocoee River.

The town of Blue Ridge has an artsy vibe, with a vibrant arts scene and great community theater. There are seven breweries in the area, including Fannin Brewing, Grumpy Old Men and Buck Bald Brewing to name a few, and two wineries, Bearclaw and Serenberry vineyards. Visit Mercier Orchards and pick apples off the tree—a true farm-to-table experience. Local food is an essential part of the trip when you visit Georgia's Blue Ridge. Eat mountain trout from Toccoa Riverside or Harvest on Main; fried apple pies and apple-cider doughnuts from Mercier's; and a cupcake from the Sweet Shoppe. Dine at casual, upscale restaurants like Black Sheep or The General Ledger, or at fun eateries like Chester Brunnenmeyer's, the Boat Dock Bar & Grill on Lake Blue Ridge or the Burra Burra on the river in McCaysville.

Or, take a tour of the only known wine cave in Georgia at **Yonah Mountain Vineyards** in Cleveland. Don't feel like organizing tour stops or designating a driver? **Pop the Cork Wine Tours** can take care of all the details.

Autumn in Georgia isn't complete without indulging in appleflavored goodies. Pick your own from more than 50 varieties at Mercier Orchards in Blue Ridge and shop for treats from hard cider to apple donuts. Don't miss a visit to the state's selfproclaimed Apple Capital, Ellijay, where **B.J. Reece Orchards** and **Red Apple Barn** stand ready to satisfy your apple cravings. The **Georgia Apple Festival** in Ellijay celebrates the almighty apple with u-pick opportunities, a parade and, of course, a bounty of apple-y treats each October.

Finally, experience quintessential autumn with a guided fall tree walk, the Run Like Hell 5K or the Spirit of Oakland Halloween Tour (book in advance) at the historical **Oakland Cemetery** in Atlanta.

Settle into a cart on the Georgia Mountain Coaster, an alpine rollercoaster where you control the speed—leave the brake off to hit up to 28 miles per hour. While many travel through Henry County on Interstate 75, few know the riches that can be found when the time is taken to explore. Located midway between Atlanta and Macon, Henry County offers seven exits off I-75 as gateways to exploration.

> SUNSET MOUNTAIN HIKE AT PANOLA MOUNTAIN STATE PARK



LOCUST GROVE

Henry County's southern-most city is most recognizable for being the home of Tanger Outlets. With more than 70 brand-named outlets, Tanger is certainly worth a visit. What travelers may not know is that just a mile from Tanger is beautiful, historical downtown Locust Grove. With a train-watching platform, local restaurants, bakeries and coffee shop, and several large antique stores, the downtown alone is worth an afternoon of exploring. Just a few miles from downtown is an adventure of a different kind at Noah's Ark Animal Sanctuary. This sanctuary is home to more than 1,000 animals representing 100 different species. Behind-the-scenes tours are available to get you up-close-andpersonal with the big cats and bears.



STOCKBRIDGE

Henry County's northernmost city has the distinction of being the home of Martin Luther King, Sr. Floyd Chapel Baptist Church, the church "Daddy King," as he was known, grew up attending and where he preached his first sermon is still an active church. Just a mile from this historical site sits the new Stockbridge Amphitheater, where music legends like Gladys Knight and Chaka Khan, and country stars like Jon Pardi have performed. History of a different kind is on display up the road at Panola Mountain State Park, where the granite outcropping, or monadnock, stands in near-pristine condition and offers visitors a view of a rare array of plants as well as a fantastic view of the Atlanta skyline. Don't forget a souvenir! Shop boutiques, barnwood furnishings and vintage vinyl in the city's array of local stores and artisan shops.



HAMPTON

Farther north lies Henry County's western-most city. Hampton's claim to fame is as the home of Atlanta Motor Speedway—the largest sporting-event facility in Georgia. In addition to two NASCAR races a year, they host fairs, festivals and car shows, and offer track tours from their gift shop during the week. Next to the speedway is Atlanta Speedway Airport, which houses the Army Aviation Heritage Foundation, the only place in the country you can fly in a Cobra helicopter and one of the few places that offers rides in a Huey helicopter. While these facilities are big on thrills, Hampton's historical downtown is rich in food, comfort and that hometown vibe. With a bookstore that sits above a Prohibition-era speakeasy, an ice-cream shop serving up homemade treats and a brewery offering guests a chair around the campfire, you will feel like family in no time.



MCDONOUGH

Henry County's county seat, McDonough, has several gems hidden in plain sight. While the Heritage Park Veterans Museum is not actually hidden, it is located in an unassuming building that resembles a red barn. Walk through the doors and be transported with stories of people who served our country from World War I to the present, as illustrated by more than 20,000 pieces of memorabilia, uniforms, weapons and more in the collection. Leave the barn and head to the farm. Southern Belle Farm is a 330-acre working agritourism farm offering four seasons of u-pick produce and family fun on the farm. While fall season may be what Southern Belle is best known for, their best (poorly) kept secret is the amazing homemade strawberry shortcake, complete with homemade strawberry ice cream.

You can easily plan your visit around any of the great events taking place in the district, but no matter when you arrive, there's likely something happening. Catch Hapeville's **Downtown Live** concert series (including a chili cook-off, seafood night and more), summer outdoor movies, College Park's annual **Kids Fest**, or the monthly **Coffee & Chrome** car and motorcycle show (April–Sept.). There are also themed events scheduled around several holidays, so if you're here during a day with "Day" (or "Día") in its name, watch out for a parade.

Cycling enthusiasts can look forward to **Spin the District**, an annual cycling series that brings multiple races and festivals to the downtown city streets. Locals turn out in droves to celebrate and cheer on the cycling world's top talent from around the globe.



SEE WHAT'S ON

Lovers of the performing arts shouldn't miss the Academy Theatre, which has the distinction of being the first integrated theater in the South and the longest-running theater company in the Southeast. (It also claims Samuel L. Jackson as an alum.) This talented troupe offers a robust rotation of plays and performances, plus a Sunday Variety Series that showcases visiting acts of all kinds.

Looking for something even more exhilarating? The Gateway Center Arena has balls in the air 12 months out of the year, thanks to the **Atlanta Dream** (WNBA) and **College Park Skyhawks** (G-League), whose seasons are perfectly offset. Best of all, you can reach the arena via the 24-hour ATL SkyTrain, a free people mover that connects the airport to the Gateway Center. (And you can get to the airport from just about anywhere via MARTA.)

ESCAPES

Georgia is home to more than 60 state parks and historic sites, all with well-kept amenities and gorgeous scenery. But beyond those similarities, they could be worlds apart, spanning features like blackwater swamps, rugged Appalachian peaks and ancient Native American cities.

Are you a seasoned backpacker? Casual leaf-peeper? Maybe you just want to trade the kids' iPads for fishing rods? Whatever the call to nature, there's a destination on this list to help you answer it. Each park is worth a visit, but to help narrow them down for your next trip, here are nine that capture the diversity of the state's outdoor offerings. Or set a goal to explore them all—you won't regret it.



ETOWAH INDIAN MOUNDS STATE HISTORIC SITE, CARTERSVILLE

The landscape may be a sea of grass, but its contours make it easy to imagine the vibrant settlement that once occupied this 54-acre plot. Constructed by the Mississippian people between 1000 and 1550 A.D., six earthen mounds rise above a broad expanse that once served as a central plaza. Surrounding it all are 10-foot defensive ditches and the sparkling Etowah River, which still holds the Native Americans' ingenious stone fish traps. Only one of the mounds has been excavated and consequently reconstructed, revealing 350 graves and intricately crafted artifacts, including a pair of painted marble effigies on view at the park's museum. The other five are undisturbed, making Etowah the most intact site of its kind in the Southeast.

BEST HEART-PUMPING HIKE

BLACK ROCK MOUNTAIN STATE PARK, MOUNTAIN CITY

This quad-busting 7.2-mile grind is worth it for the sweeping views and forested beauty. As the most advanced hike in Georgia's highest-elevation state park, the James E. Edmonds Backcountry Trail challenges with lengthy and steep ascents, especially on the latter half, along with stunning Blue Ridge panoramas. Survey the scenic Wolffork Valley, miles of indigo peaks and a vivid palette of wildflowers: flaming azaleas and deeppurple trillium in spring, pale-pink mountain laurel in summer. Other features include cascading streams and a sparkling lake. Recuperate in a rocking chair on the porch at one of the park's 10 newly renovated cottages for a helping of blissful solitude.

BEST PLACE TO WATCH THE SUNSET

MISTLETOE STATE PARK, APPLING

The vast, glassy surface of Georgia's largest reservoir, Clarks Hill Lake, makes an especially beautiful mirror for pink-streaked skies at this familyfriendly park. Take in the view from 10 fully equipped cottages and cabins overlooking the water, a lakeside "tent cabin" for four (bring your sleeping bags) or campsites on a peninsula surrounded by open water-which means you can watch the sun set and rise without moving your hammock. When you're not kicking up your feet, hike or mountain bike on more than 15 miles of shaded trails, play on a sandy beach, rent a kayak to explore numerous quiet coves or try your luck reeling in the trophy bass for which the reservoir is famous.

CLOUDLAND CANYON STATE PARK, RISING FAWN

Perched on Lookout Mountain, this poetically named park is known to hold the state's most spectacular scenery, revealed to visitors across 64 miles of footpaths. *Backpacker* magazine named the West Rim Loop Trail one of the country's best day hikes thanks to endless views of a 1,000-foot chasm—a playground for birds of prey, who float and dive over the lush foliage below. Tackle 600 metal stairs to admire a pair of waterfalls plunging over sandstone cliffs into emerald pools, and hike deeper into the canyon to experience a serene hemlock forest. No need to pack it all into one day: The park offers 16 cottages, a variety of campsites and—for the glamping crowd—10 canvas yurts.

★ BEST OFF-THE-BEATEN-PATH ADVENTURE

GEORGE L. SMITH STATE PARK, TWIN CITY

The centerpiece of this South Georgia gem is a 412-acre blackwater pond that's so scenic and tranquil, you won't mind sharing it with the occasional gator. To paddle it is to navigate around grand cypress trees draped with Spanish moss and crowned with osprey nests. Bring your own kayak, rent one from the park or book a guided paddle with local outfitter Mill Pond Kayak—then skim past lily pads, turtles sunning on logs and a covered bridge from an 1879-built mill. On dry land, keep an eye out for endangered gopher tortoises along 7 miles of hiking trails, and spend the night in one of the spacious cottages or waterside campsites that bring the otherworldly beauty right to your door.





BEST PRESIDENTIAL PEDIGREE

LITTLE WHITE HOUSE STATE HISTORIC SITE, WARM SPRINGS

Once upon a time, a VIP named FDR came to GA for a little R&R, then formed the CCC. Translation: From the 1920s to the 1940s, former U.S. President Franklin Roosevelt frequently traveled to Warm Springs to recover from the crippling after-effects of polio. In 1932, he built a modest vacation cottage—today a national historic landmark where visitors can tour the property and see artifacts such as his hand-controlled Ford convertible and the "Unfinished Portrait" for which he was sitting when he collapsed and died at the home in 1945. Historians credit FDR's time in rural Georgia with inspiring the public works programs of the New Deal, among them the Civilian Conservation Corps, which erected many of the state and national parks we enjoy today.

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★ BEST GEOLOGICAL FORMATION

PROVIDENCE CANYON STATE PARK, LUMPKIN

If you've ever traveled through the American Southwest, you'll find this sight oddly familiar, with its mineral-streaked gullies, chimney-shaped rocks and narrow gorges that stretch across 300 acres. Aptly known as Georgia's "Little Grand Canyon," the park makes for an unforgettable day hike or overnight camping adventure. Ten miles of trails, including a 7-mile backcountry loop, showcase the striking colors and textures. Bring shoes you don't mind getting a little dirty while exploring the canyon floor, home to uncommon flora such as bigleaf magnolias and plumleaf azaleas.

BEST FOR FAMILY-FRIENDLY WATER REC

SEMINOLE STATE PARK, DONALSONVILLE

Marking the confluence of the Flint and Chattahoochee rivers, 37,500-acre Lake Seminole is broad enough to accommodate tube-toting pontoons, peaceful enough for a scenic paddle and one of the top fishing destinations in Georgia. Rent a kayak on site and explore lily-pad-loaded coves, or bring your tackle box to hook catfish, crappie or bass from the large dock. Kids will love making sandcastles by the swimming area or s'mores at the cottage firepits. Hike the 2.2-mile Gopher Tortoise Trail, and keep your eyes peeled for alligators, bald eagles and the telltale burrows of the path's namesake reptile.

MOST SPECTACULAR CANYON

TALLULAH GORGE STATE PARK, TALLULAH FALLS

At 2 miles long and nearly 1,000 feet deep, this magnificent gash in the earth incites awe from every angle. Casual onlookers can view its thundering waterfalls from a flat rim trail, while adventurers may aspire to cross a knee-buckling suspension bridge or rock-hop along the gorge floor. Don't neglect more serene vantage points, including a paved path along the Tallulah River and a sandy beach on Tallulah Lake—a summertime treat in a park famed for fall color. Visit on dam-release days in April and November to watch skilled kayakers brave the churning waters.

BLUE RIDGE SCENIC RAILWAY

BLUE RIDGE

This train journey begins in the small North Georgia mountain town of Blue Ridge and goes through forests and along the Toccoa River. One dedicated, open-air train car is equipped with two lifts, allowing wheelchair users to easily board. A spacious family/ companion-care restroom is available inside the accessible train car as well. Car 405 was originally built in 1947 for the Boston & Maine Railroad so its passengers get to enjoy the historical feel of riding the rails while a car host points out interesting landmarks as they pass by.

TYBEE ISLAND BEACHES

TYBEE ISLAND

If you're looking to soak up the sun at an accessible beach, special beach wheelchairs are available on a first-come, first-served basis at the Ocean Rescue lifeguard station on South Beach. They even have a chair that can float in the water! Additionally, multiple beach-access mats—called Mobi-mats—are available to navigate your own wheelchair on the beach. (Tip: You can find similar amenities on Jekyll Island.)

GEORGIA STATE PARKS

MULTIPLE LOCATIONS

Thanks to Georgia Department of Natural Resources and the Aimee Copeland Foundation, qualifying visitors can explore Georgia's natural side via free, high-mobility, all-terrain track wheelchairs that let you hike, hunt, fish and more. Ten state parks, historic sites and a wildlife center offer the chairs, and you can also find numerous accessible amenities and places to stay at Georgia State Parks and Historic Sites.



LION'S EYE TRAIL

NEAR HELEN

Located at Anna Ruby Falls, the Lion's Eye Trail was specifically created for people with visual impairments to enjoy. It is a fully paved hiking trail with interpretive signs in both normal text and Braille. A cable handrail is available to guide you from one interpretive sign to the next. This trail is 0.1 mile long and goes along Smith Creek.

FERNBANK MUSEUM OF NATURAL HISTORY

ATLANTA

Fernbank consists of a natural-history museum, a Giant Screen Theater and an old-growth forest. They strive to be accessible for all guests; and for those with visual impairments, Fernbank offers descriptive-narration headsets in the Giant Screen Theater, where science-based docs and IMAX films like "Dinosaurs of Antarctica" and "Secrets of the Sea" are shown daily. These headsets feature an adjustable volume control that describes the visual setting and action taking place in the film. Audio and sound effects are amplified in the movie as well.

COLLEGE FOOTBALL HALL OF FAME

ATLANTA

If you are a sports fan at all, the College Football Hall of Fame in downtown Atlanta is calling you. There are a variety of interactive exhibits, making this a fun attraction even for those who aren't huge college football fans. For visitors with visual impairments, the hall can arrange complimentary tour guides when given 48 hours' notice.

STONE MOUNTAIN PARK

STONE MOUNTAIN

This is one of the Southeast's most visited attractions—and after visiting yourself, you'll understand why. You can ride a cable car to the top of the mountain and enjoy a variety of other activities as someone with hearing impairments. The 4-D theater and the scenic railroad have written scripts available, and the Memorial Hall Auditorium has closed captioning available on the screen if you ask a team member before the show begins. (Entrances to all attractions are wheelchair-accessible, too.)

NATIONAL CENTER FOR CIVIL & HUMAN RIGHTS

ATLANTA

This museum believes in justice and dignity for all and, therefore, is fully inclusive for all abilities, including those with hearing impairments. There are immersive exhibits and events, which will give you a greater appreciation for how far we've come in the quest for equality and how much further we still need to go. Handheld text and audio devices are available for checkout upon entry.

FOX THEATRE

ATLANTA

IMAN RIGHTS

The legendary Fox Theatre hosts numerous concerts, touring Broadway shows and other productions throughout the year. Designated seats for guests with hearing impairments are available in the front of the theater. Assisted-listening devices are available on a first-come, first-served basis at all performances, and closed captioning can be requested by calling the ticket office. Sign-language-interpreting services are also offered for certain show dates but can always be requested by calling the ticket office at least two weeks in advance of your show date.

TAP INTO YOUR OWN POWER

The National Center for Civil & Human Rights is an organization built to "inspire people to tap into their own power and change the world around them." Exhibitions focus on the history of the civil rights movement in the U.S. and the struggle for human rights around the world.

BEACH BOUND

Escape to the relaxing beaches of Georgia's 100 miles of shoreline and 14 barrier islands, where unspoiled sandy shores await your beach blanket, sun-kissed paddlers seek a workout, adventure-spent vacationers wind down over fresh seafood, and the unique history of the state is on display in historical ports and towns. The whole region is perfectly positioned for family fun in the sun, and once you're on Georgia's coast, it's easy to visit several beaches—including those on St. Simons, Tybee, Cumberland, Sapelo and Jekyll islands—to multiply your shoreside fun.



With its blend of history, natural beauty and varied outdoor activities, St. Simons Island is a quintessential Georgia beach destination. The largest of the Golden Isles, it's easily accessible by car, minutes from I-95 and just over an hour from **Savannah/Hilton Head International Airport**. Its modern history dates back more than 400 years, when Spanish explorers came ashore looking for gold. Take advantage of pristine beaches ripe for swimming, beachcombing and soaking up sea breezes, or grab a kayak or paddleboard for a water tour.

On the ocean side of the island, **East Beach** is loved by pedalers on cruiser bikes and families taking a break from beachcombing. At **Gould's Inlet**, birders, anglers and paddleboarders can be seen along the boardwalk and the distant sandbars. The **Coast Guard Station** section offers many amenities alongside its wide, sandy expanses, including a wheelchair mat, showers, picnic tables and a summer snack shop. Off the beach, don some sturdy boots to spy on the birds and sealife that live amid the salt tides—ribbed mussels, periwinkle snails, wood storks, American oysters, redfish and more provide a wondrous coastal classroom.

Immerse yourself in history at the stops along the Gullah Geechee Cultural Heritage Corridor National Heritage Area, including the Historical Harrington School. Built in the 1920s to serve the island's three African American communities, the school is now a cultural center and museum. Visit the archaeological remnants of Fort Frederica National Monument (also part of the national heritage area), where Spanish and British forces skirmished in 1742. See the Native American grounds at Gascoigne Bluff and go on a scavenger hunt for Tree Spirits—meticulously carved faces seen throughout the island's dignified oak trees.

In between, the island's **Pier Village** is a delightful blend of quaint and modern, with a mix of boutiques and restaurants just steps away from the water. Whether you take a guided trolley tour or go it alone on foot or atop a bicycle, there's plenty to see and do.

Local ingredients, global influences and made-from-scratch preparations are hallmarks of the menu at **Halyards**, where the catch of the day and a perfectly grilled filet mignon shouldn't be missed.

🖹 Sleep

For an adults-only getaway, look no further than **Hotel Simone**, where luxury suites include access to a rooftop lounge, glittering plunge pool and beach bicycles.

Stay at the island's only waterfront resort, **The King & Prince**, which dates to the 1930s. Choose from refreshed resort rooms, villas and residences, and enjoy an 18-hole championship golf course and three swimming pools.



Roam around **Pier Village**, the island's social hub, with its local shops and restaurants, and climb the 1872 **St. Simons Lighthouse** for sweeping views of the Atlantic and a glimpse of the island's maritime history.

Learn how the region protected the coast from German submarines and built Liberty ships at the **World War II Home Front Museum**. Then, soak up some sun at nearby **Coast Guard Station Beach**, a centerpiece of all the action, or search for the island's **Tree Spirits**.

Boutique hotels housed in renovated historical buildings and chef-driven restaurants breaking Southern food norms are just two examples. And "urban" doesn't mean they're all asphalt and glass: Each metro area boasts easy access to green spaces, breathtaking river sports, pastoral paths for cyclists and much more.

The South's capital is a progressive melting pot, which is evident in its robust culture, trendy restaurants and neighborhoods with their own distinct personalities. Just drive down **Peachtree Road**, one of the city's major veins, to find everything from falafel and bulgogi to authentic Neapolitan pizza and chicken and waffles. Take a world-tasting tour under one roof at innovative food halls, including **The Municipal Market**, **Chattahoochee Food Works** and **Ponce City Market**.

Family attractions cater to many interests: Learn about the civil rights movement at Martin Luther King, Jr. National Historical Park and The National Center for Civil and Human Rights, stroll through magical displays at the Atlanta Botanical Garden, try hands-on creative activities at the Children's Museum of Atlanta or go on a nature quest at Fernbank Museum of Natural History.

Atlanta is made up of a grouping of neighborhoods, each with a unique vibe and strong sense of community. Get to know a couple: **Grant Park** boasts **Zoo Atlanta** (and its beloved giant panda cubs) along with too-prettynot-to-Insta Victorian-era houses. **Oakland Cemetery** is the final resting place of Margaret Mitchell, Maynard Jackson and Bobby Jones, and is also home to blooming gardens, magnolia trees and themed tours like Black Magnolias—which explores the lives of Atlanta's African American women. **Inman Park's** treelined streets, cobblestone lanes and lush front-yard gardens make you want to slow down and breathe in the fresh air. Sit awhile at the many sidewalk cafes, before popping into chic boutiques or sipping a creative cocktail, especially along **Highland Avenue**, or strolling the **Freedom Park Trail**.

As you roam the city, keep an eye out for more than 1,000 vivid street murals—and maybe even some **Tiny Doors**—created by local and international artists.

Taste an eclectic mix of cuisines at Colony Square's elegant **Politan Row** food hall, complete with a hidden cocktail lounge and curated tasting experience that raises the bar of communal dining—think ponzu tuna bowls, chutney-topped pizzas and oxtail street tacos.

Follow that with chef Deborah VanTrece's globally inspired fusion soul food at **Twisted Soul Cookhouse** & Pours—a consistent standout on Atlanta's robust foodie scene. Try the flash-fried chicken wings with coconut gravy, sweet-tea baby-back ribs and peach-cobbler parfait to satisfy chic comfort-food cravings.

🖹 Sleep

Soak in some of the best panoramic views of downtown Atlanta from the observatory level of the 73-floor **Westin Peachtree Plaza**. The modern hotel is an excellent hub for visiting most of the city's attractions.

The elegant **Georgian Terrace** hotel evokes a Southern interpretation of Parisian architecture and luxurious accommodations. Just steps away from the **Fox Theatre**, it's central to Atlanta's performing arts scene.

Do

Stroll around **Centennial Olympic Park**, an attraction unto itself. A legacy of the 1996 Summer Olympic Games, today the park is host to playgrounds, gardens, picnic spots and The Fountain of Rings, one of the city's most iconic landmarks.

Within walking distance of the park, there are several attractions: Travel 20 stories up to take in the city from a private gondola on the **SkyView Atlanta** Ferris wheel. Get nose to nose with a Beluga whale or bottlenose dolphin, and witness frolicking sea lions and African penguins at **Georgia Aquarium**. Sip beverages from around the world, guess the ingredients by their scents and see the hypnotic bottling process at **World of Coca-Cola**. Participate in a lunch-counter sit-in simulation at **The National Center for Civil and Human Rights**.

SEA-LION LOVE

The Georgia Aquarium in Atlanta has several special encounters visitors can book in advance that get you up close and personal with some of its favorite residents, including sea lions, dolphins, penguins and sharks.

This globally inspired city is filled with annual festivals celebrating Black heritage, film, jazz, seafood and more. PEAKS OF PERFECTION

Take the high road and visit the North Georgia mountains for jaw-dropping scenery, award-winning vineyards and idyllic small towns with plenty to explore, including Blue Ridge, Ellijay, Clayton, Dahlonega and Helen. The Chattahoochee-Oconee National Forest stretches across the state's northern border, and the southern end of the Appalachian Mountains peppers the landscape with spectacular summits—the perfect start or end to any Appalachian Trail trek. Scenic vistas transform with the seasons and top-notch hiking trails, rolling rivers and pristine lakes (dreams for anglers), and the cooling spray of rushing waterfalls are fantastic ways to experience them. The area is also rich in history, with ties to Native American heritage, Southern Appalachian folk culture and more. Walkable downtowns, restaurants that leverage the region's signature fruits, cozy cabins and B&Bs, and cultural treasures ensure there are plenty of ways to relax on getaways of any length.



Consistently ranked one of the South's top destinations, Blue Ridge is a quintessential American mountain town. It's a true escape from the everyday, nestled amid miles of gentle peaks, forested trails, trout-filled streams and **Lake Blue Ridge**. When visitors have had more serene natural encounters than they can handle, the walkable, artsy downtown awaits with noteworthy places to eat, wet their whistles and share fish tales with other blissedout locals and visitors.

The **Toccoa River**'s pristine waterway has a reputation as the trout-fishing capital of the state, and it's equally popular for kayaking and tubing. **Mercier Orchards**, family owned since 1943, lets guests pick their own apples from more than 50 varieties. Pick up treats such as apple butter, fried apple donuts and hard cider.

For a taste of the famed Appalachian Trail, head to Springer Mountain. It's the 2,190-mile hike's southern terminus and the spot where day hikers will find paths in varying levels of difficulty along with sweeping mountain views. Connect with Hike the Ridge for guided sunset or sunrise hikes. For those looking for views from a more relaxed position, several scenic drives fan out from town (stop by the welcome center for maps) through mountainous areas, lush countrysides and leafy wilderness, as well as several waterfalls, including Amicalola Falls—the tallest cascading waterfall east of the Mississippi River. For more water refreshment, hook up with several outfitters just outside town for an Ocoee River whitewater adventure or splash into the Toccoa with Blue Ridge Tubing.

Carve out plenty of time to meander around downtown. There, you'll find upscale shops, curated galleries with work from local artists, farm-to-table restaurants and breweries. Hit up the tasting rooms of **Angry Hops Brewing, Fannin Brewing Company** and **Bear Claw Vineyards** to sample the region's bounty. Follow that with dinner at **Bin 322 Wine & Tapas Bar, Harvest On Main** or **Southern Charm** and your Blue Ridge to-do list will be complete.

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Raft, tube or kayak down the Ocoee River, rolling and bobbing past lush forestland as your guide dazzles you with details about the river's history and ecology.

🗊 Eat

Classic Cuban sandwiches, sweet plantains and beef-picadillo empanadas are standouts at family-owned **Rum Cake Lady Cuban Cafe**. Don't walk out without a signature rum-soaked bundt cake.

Everyone's welcome at **The Black Sheep**, where the spacious patio on the Butt House (built in 1914) is a top spot for brunch. Favorites include the chicken and red-velvet waffles and the crab-cake eggs Benedict.

📇 Sleep

Get the true mountain experience and plenty of peace and privacy—by booking a cabin. Choose from local rentals like **Escape to Blue Ridge**, offering scenic mountaintop or riverside views.

The shiny new Hampton Inn by

Hilton is centrally located across from the historic train depot. Take advantage of the rooftop bar with summit views, pet-friendly rooms and complimentary breakfast.



Venture outside downtown to take in glistening **Lake Blue Ridge**'s 65 miles of shoreline populated by campsites, boat ramps, a marina and swimming areas. At **Blue Ridge Boat Rentals**, get yourself onto a pontoon, ski boat, Wave Runner, wake board, lily pad, kayak or paddleboard. Take a short hike on the Benton MacKaye Trail to see the **Toccoa River Swinging Bridge**.

Find yourself on a guided wine tasting at **Serenberry Vineyards & Winery** and then enjoy some snacks or a picnic in the pastoral, open-air barn.

Nature lovers won't want to miss **Clayton**, home to numerous fishing spots, breathtaking waterfalls and wildflower views, along with **Black Rock Mountain State Park**, the highestelevation state park in Georgia. Nestled at the base of Black Rock Mountain itself, Clayton has also earned a reputation

as the state's farm-to-table capital. Taste the artfully prepared agricultural bounty at **The Market at the Clayton Cafe** and **Fortify Kitchen & Bar**. Fuel up for outdoor adventures, such as watersports on **Lake Burton** or any number of spectacular hikes. For a moderate trek, pick up Dicks Creek Gap to Bly Gap Camp—an 8.7-mile section of the **Appalachian Trail**—to follow the famed path as it slices through the forest's fern-carpeted floor.

The state's apple capital of **Ellijay** allures year-round with festivals (including fall's annual **Georgia Apple Festival**), orchards and restaurants leveraging the region's signature fruit. Sample fruity treats from nearly a dozen farms, including **Panorama Orchards and Farm Market**, or pick your own at **Hillcrest Orchards** and the **Red Apple Barn**. Savor the crisp flavor of Georgia apples in a different form at **Reece's Cider Co**. or take a tasting tour of the area's numerous vineyards. And Ellijay is as much for outdoors-lovers as it is for foodies. Go tubing on the **Cartecay River**, hike along miles of secluded trails or test your skills on a mountain bike. Nearby **Carters Lake** is perfect for boating, camping, picnicking, birding or simply soaking up the views.

SMALL-TOWN SPLENDOR

Embrace the local character and strong sense of community in Georgia's small towns while also exploring outdoor attractions, important pieces of history and delightful dining. Places like Milledgeville, Thomasville, Rome, Cartersville, Americus, Plains and Athens offer peaceful havens from the state's bustling cities. These destinations somehow feel nostalgic without sacrificing modern-day luxuries. Not only are these gems brimming with charisma, history and natural splendor, they also harbor surprising landmarks you may not know about until you make the detour.







Athens may be a cool college town, the birthplace of public higher education and a venue for top university sports, but it also has vibrant arts, music and nightlife scenes, a craft-beer trail, affordable destination dining and serene moments along the Oconee River Greenway.

Each neighborhood around the Classic City offers a distinctive vibe while still celebrating its traditional Southern character. Walk the restored Victorianera downtown, retro yet trendy Normaltown and sophisticated Five Points. Stroll through the manicured acres of the State Botanical Garden of Georgia, appreciating the largest porcelain and decorativeart collection in the state. Find even more creative inspiration on the University of Georgia campus at the Georgia Museum of Art. Two of their standout collections include American paintings by Winslow Homer, James McNeill Whistler, Georgia O'Keeffe, Andrew Wyeth and Alice Neel, as well as the Thompson Collection of African American Art, which features paintings, prints and sculpture from emerging and regional artists.

Iconic music venues hold performances year-round in the town that gave birth to R.E.M., The B-52s and Widespread Panic. The Athens Music Walk of Fame passes by several of those spots, including the Morton Theatre, 40 Watt Club and the Georgia Theatre. Visit during summer to attend AthFest Music and Arts Festival, one of the town's most popular cultural events. Later in the year, The Georgia Music Hall of Fame will open its museum experience in the Classic Center Arena, displaying memorabilia from the state's greats and diving into the roots of bluegrass, gospel, soul and rock 'n roll.

Meet artists, shop for locally made products and organic produce, and catch live bands and kids' activities at the weekly **Athens Farmers Market**. Gastropubs, breweries and coffee shops dot nearly every corner of the city, and delicious food isn't hard to come by with the town's wide selection of independently owned restaurants. Indulge in English-style afternoon tea at **The Café on Lumpkin**, enjoy Southern staples at **Home.made** and splurge on dinner at celebrity-chef-driven **Five & Ten**.



🐘 Eat

Fine-dining favorite **The National** marries the Mediterranean to the South, using seasonal, farmsourced ingredients served in a laid-back, restored industrial building reminiscent of a European cafe.

Brunch spot **Mama's Boy** is beloved among locals. Head to one of two locations for made-from-scratch buttery biscuits, peach French toast and even chocolate cake for breakfast.

📇 Sleep

Hotel Indigo Athens offers a chic stay in the heart of downtown. An on-site art gallery features work by local artists and farm-to-table cuisine leads the menu at its Madison Bar & Bistro.

Located in the Five Points neighborhood, **ATH**|**BNB The Rushmore** is a former fraternity house turned luxury bed-and-breakfast. Each of the 14 uniquely designed suites is fitted with custom furnishings and designer textiles.

Do 🗊

Sample the wares at local craft breweries, including **Creature Comforts Brewing Co.** and **Terrapin Beer**, along the **Athens Beer Trail**. Visit all six breweries in the 9-mile area to win a keepsake Athens Beer Trail Mug.

Spend some time treasure hunting in downtown's shops—especially those serving up upscale or quirky vintage fashion and homegoods, including Community, Agora Vintage, Dynamite Vintage Clothing, Suska and Emmanuel Episcopal Thrift House.

LIVE-MUSIC HUB

No trip to Athens can be considered complete without taking in a show or two. Epically cool venues with storied histories and lists of bands who got their starts in them—like the Georgia Theatre—ensure you'll arrive back home feeling epically cool yourself.



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SCAN FOR MORE Discover other alluring small towns.

Host of the **Rose Show and Festival** every spring since 1922, **Thomasville** is also known for "**the Big Oak**," a 337-year-old tree and popular photo spot (even President Eisenhower took

pictures with this leafy local legend) and its well-preserved Victorian-era architecture. Learn about some of America's and Thomasville's first Black achievers at Jack Hadley Black History Museum. Then stop into more than 100 independent shops and restaurants around town such as the Fuzzy Goat yarn shop, The Pink Valise Boutique and Relish's "celebration of cooking." For dining, you really can't miss in downtown, but some top spots include Jonah's Fish & Grits, The Local Kickstand and Hubs & Hops.

Milledgeville is one of the state's oldest towns, brimming with scenic and historical squares, houses, churches and cemeteries, while maintaining an energetic college-town vibe. Hop on Milly the Trolley for a tour before hitting up sites like The Sallie Ellis Davis House, a pillar of the African American community in the early 1900s. Cool off with a boat, kayak, tube or fishing trip at Lake Sinclair and along the Oconee River Greenway—several outfitters, including Oconee Outfitters and Krazy Dave's—can get you set up with rentals and transportation. You'll find plenty of great food, shops and live music in the walkable downtown after your explorations. In December, visit for Christmas at Georgia's Old Governor's Mansion, a cheerful display of holiday decorations from the 1850s.

COMING TO ATHENS THE CLASSIC CENTER AREAD

Just a short walk from Downtown Athens will emerge an all-new local hub boasting an 8,500-capacity arena, a collection from the Georgia Music Hall of Fame, restaurants, and fun events for all ages. From concerts to entertainment, conventions to sports, The Classic Center Arena and Downtown Athens will leave you impressed.
